To become President (the 20th) of the Society in the year it stages its 80th Show is an honour indeed. Looking back – back to 1975 when Carole and I moved into Froggatt – the first show we attended was that year in the Stoke Hall field and it was the 31st Annual Show. As some know, the first Show back in 1935 was held in what was known as The Chequers Inn Pavilion – how grand! It was a small hall on what is now the Chequers Inn car park.

We joined the committee in 1978 and are still there nearly 50 years on.

All the 'jobs' I have undertaken or learnt, include the setting out of the field under the instruction of Bill Robinson, and the assembly and distribution of the Show signs - initially this meant an evening out on the back of Clifford Morton's coal lorry with Ray and Geoff Booker and Mike Hibbs helping. Also, the setting up and running of the gas boilers under Clifford Morton's instruction - ensuring a constant supply of boiling water to those on the teapot front line! Finally, of course the Show Auction of Produce taken on from Mike Hibbs who left us far too early.

The Show committee tread a tricky path trying to balance the show's traditional village horticultural appeal with "keeping up with the times" and expectations of our visitors. What is certain is that to ensure the future years of Froggatt Show, we need many exhibitors and even more entries to make the marquee the spectacle we know and love.

Changes for our 80th Show

Due to dwindling entries over recent years, the Rider & Ponies Section will no longer feature in the Show. Instead, we are delighted that the charity Support Dogs will be presenting a Fun Dog Show in the ring. New Classes for 2026

This year we have included peppers in the Vegetable Section and a jar of pickles in the Domestic Section.

Hints to Exhibitors

Its easy to enter the show, but we know it can be a bit daunting if its your first time so here are a few handy tips:

How to Enter – Fill in the Entry Form which can be found in the centre pages of the Show Schedule and bring it to the Froggatt Wesleyan Reform Chapel on Wednesday evening 26th August between 7-9pm. You will need one entry form per exhibitor.

Vegetables – Select even-sized, unblemished specimens. Carefully wash roots but do not brush as this may damage the skins. Tomatoes and peppers are classified as vegetables.

Fruit – Should be fresh, uniform, free from blemish; preserve the natural bloom; keep the stalks intact. If multiple items are submitted, they should all be close in size and shape.

Flowers – Cut in the evening before the show or in the early morning. Remove damaged flowers, discoloured or broken leaves. Remember to bring water to prevent your blooms wilting on the day. Roses should, if possible, be buds just beginning to open, not fully open.

Flower arrangements – You can use flowers/foilage from your own garden, or bought flowers and accessories. You don't need to have grown everything yourself.

Domestic – All exhibits must be covered – so we keep some spare clingfilm handy. Check the schedule to avoid mistakes e.g. if it says a round of shortbread don't submit shortbread fingers by mistake. Try to avoid using ready-made tin liners or allowing cooling rack marks, these can be avoided by using a sheet of baking parchment or a clean tea towel on your rack before turning out your cake.

Preserves - Do not use jars and lids with commercial markings or patterns. Jars should be covered with a wax disc and cellophane top or a twist lid. If using a twist lid there's no need to apply a wax disc. Labels should be on straight and clearly marked with the type of preserve and date of making. Fill jars as full as possible, which is normally to within ¼" of the rim. For jellies, the brighter the colour the better. Tip: to achieve even distribution of peel in marmalade allow the mixture to cool slightly before filling the jars, otherwise fruit may rise to the surface.

We always welcome new FHS Patrons, if you would like to consider becoming a patron, please contact the society treasurer (info@froggattshow.org) and refer to the FHS general rule 5.

In order to deliver the show, Froggatt and District Horticultural Society does require help setting up on the Friday afternoon, and the Saturday both during the show and after to pack it away. If you would like to offer your help for a few hours over the Friday or Saturday please email info@froggattshow.org.

SHOW REGULATIONS

1. All persons entering the Show Ground on the day of the Show must pay an entry fee.
2. Exhibitors, other than in Junior classes, must be Patrons or, on payment of a subscription of £1.00, members of the Society on the day of the Show only.
3. All subscriptions to the Society must be paid before entries are accepted.
4. The entry fee for all classes, except Children's Classes, shall be determined by the Committee.
- 5a. **All entry forms to be submitted by Wednesday evening prior to the date of the Show. Late entries will only be accepted at the discretion of the Secretary.**
- 5b. All exhibits must be staged before 10.20 a.m. on the morning of the Show. This regulation will be enforced.
The specimens must be allowed to remain on the tables until 5.00 p.m. No person will be allowed in the Show during the judging, except those appointed by the Committee.
6. All specimens shown for the competition must belong to the exhibitor, and have been raised by them in their own garden, or have been in their possession at least eight weeks prior to the Show. Any member violating this rule shall be disqualified in all classes for the Show. The Committee may inspect each member's garden, window or greenhouse, and members must show, if required to do so, the stock from which they have grown their exhibit.
7. Not more than one member of a household may enter the same variety of a flower or vegetable in any one class: but may enter a different variety of the same kind of flower or vegetable in that same class. **Multiple entries are allowed but restricted to 2 entries per person, per class; no exhibitor shall be awarded more than one prize in any one class.**
8. Entries in the Handicraft and Craft Sections shall be restricted to work not previously entered in Froggatt Show.
9. Only one drawing or painting to be exhibited for competition by any one child in the Children's Classes, other items may be exhibited at the discretion of the Committee.
- 9a. Only one photograph to be exhibited for competition by any one person in each of the adult Photographic Classes.
10. Entries for the Dog Classes will only be accepted on Show Day from 2pm on the field.
11. For the purposes of this Society, the Local Section shall be for residents residing in Froggatt, Curbar and Calver.
12. The measurement of bowls or pots, as stated, will be the inside measurement in all cases.
13. Prizes of £2.00 (1st), £1.50 (2nd), £1.00 (3rd) will be awarded in all classes except Floral Art classes and those where Special Prizes are awarded.
14. The Judge is empowered to hold prizes where, in the opinion of a Judge, an award is not justified.
15. All objections, in writing, must be lodged with the Secretary by 3.00 p.m. on the day of the Show accompanied by a fee of £1.00 which will be refunded if the objection is upheld.
16. Prize money must be collected from the Secretary's office on the Show Ground between 3.00 p.m. and 5.00 p.m.
17. Exhibitors who wish to take their exhibits home must remove them between 5.00 p.m. and 5.15 p.m., after which time the Auctioneer will offer for sale those not claimed, for the benefit of the Society.
18. All trophies are the property of the Society and must be given up to the Society for further competition, one month before the date of the next Show.
19. The Committee shall not hold themselves responsible for loss or accidental damage to exhibits etc.

GENERAL RULES

1. The Society shall be named the Froggatt and District Horticultural Society.
2. The Society shall hold an Annual General Meeting on the first Monday in November at 7.30 p.m. in the Froggatt Wesleyan Reform Chapel, at which the Officers and Committee of the Society shall be elected.
3. The Officers of the Society shall be a President, elected annually for not more than three consecutive years, and one or more Vice-Presidents, Secretary and Treasurer and Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Committee. The business of the Society shall be conducted by the Committee, of which the Officers shall be ex-officio members. It shall have the power to co-opt additional members. A quorum shall be a minimum of five members.
4. The Treasurer shall present to the Annual General Meeting the Audited Accounts for the financial year to the preceding 30th September. The Society shall appoint an Honorary Auditor annually for this purpose.
5. The Society shall be supported by annual subscriptions from the Patron Members which shall become due on October 1st each year, minimum subscriptions £5.00 per person.
6. The Judges for the Annual Show shall be appointed by the Committee.
7. In the event of possible cancellation or change of venue of the Annual Show, this decision to be taken by the following officers of the society Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer together with the Show Manager. Where practical those officers will endeavour to discuss the cancellation with the committee.
8. These rules shall not be altered except at the Annual General Meeting, or at a Special General Meeting called for that purpose.

Trophies are awarded for individual classes across the sections. Please see entry sections for details. The following trophies awarded annually based on highest number of points or Best in Show are as follows:

THE MOORLANDS TROPHY for the highest number of points in the Show, excluding points gained in the Local Sections.

THE NICHOLSON TROPHY for the best exhibit in the Local, Vegetable & Fruit, Flowers and Master Gardener Sections.

THE JOHN MORTON TROPHY for the highest number of points gained by any exhibitor residing in Curbar, Calver and Froggatt.

THE WINNIE FLETCHER TROPHY for the highest number of points in the Show gained by a junior exhibitor.

The Committee tender their very best thanks to their numerous Patrons, Members and Exhibitors who have made it possible for our Society to hold a successful Show; to H. Warren and Sons for the use of the field wherein to hold our Show free of charge; to the donors of Trophies to be competed for each year; to our several friends who have given us special prizes; to our judges, and to all who have in any way assisted in helping to make our Society and Show a success.

Cake Recipes

Fruit Tea Bread

450g (1lb) loaf tin, 1 cup of All Bran, 1 cup of mixed fruit, ¾ cup of sugar, 1 cup of milk, 1 cup of self raising flour. Put All Bran, fruit and sugar in a bowl. Pour on the milk. Soak for at least 1 hour. Stir and then add the flour to the ingredients in the bowl. Mix well. Put the mixture into a greased and lined tin. Cook on Gas Mark 2-3 or 150-170°C for approx 1½ hours. Remove paper whilst still hot.

Dundee Cake

17.5cm (7in) tin, 225g (8oz) plain flour, 5ml (1 tsp) baking powder, pinch of salt, 175g (6oz) margarine or butter, 175g (6oz) soft brown sugar, 175g (6oz) sultanas, 175g (6oz) currants, 50g (2oz) peel, 25g (1oz) cherries, 3 hen eggs, pinch of mixed spice, 15ml (1tbsp) milk, 25g (1oz) almonds for the top.

Yorkshire Parkin

20cm (8in) square tin, 175g (6oz) butter, 175g (6oz) golden syrup, 175g (6oz) soft brown sugar, 4ml (¼ tsp) bicarbonate of soda, 135ml (9tbsp) milk, 175g (6oz) plain flour, 175g (6oz) medium oatmeal, 10ml (2tsp) ground ginger, 7.5ml (1½ tsp) mixed spice, 2 hen eggs, pinch of salt. Melt the butter, syrup and sugar, stirring regularly (do not boil). Dissolve bicarbonate of soda in 1tbsp of milk. Mix the flour with the spice, ground ginger and oatmeal in a bowl and make a well in the centre. Beat in the melted ingredients, remaining milk and beaten eggs. Mix in the bicarbonate of soda. Bake for approx 1 hour gas mark 3 (170°C).

Victoria Sandwich

Two 15cm – 17.5cm (6–7 in). tins, 2 hen eggs, weight of eggs in butter or margarine, sugar and self raising flour, pinch of salt, a little water. Sprinkle with castor sugar.

Chocolate Cake

Two 15cm – 17.5cm (6-7 in). tins, 2 hen eggs, weight of eggs in butter or margarine, sugar and self raising flour (substituting 25g (1oz) cocoa powder for 25g (1oz) of flour), pinch of salt and water. Make as for a normal Victoria sandwich cake. Fill with chocolate butter icing and sprinkle with caster sugar.

Lemon Drizzle Cake

175g (6oz) margarine, 175g (6oz) castor sugar, grated rind of 1 lemon, 2 hen eggs, 175g (6oz) self raising flour, 60ml (4 tbsp) milk, juice of 1 lemon. Beat margarine, sugar and rind to a soft cream. Beat in eggs and stir in flour and milk. Turn into 1kg (2lb) loaf tin. Bake at Regulo 4 (180°C) for approx 1 hour. Whilst cake is still hot, score top and pour over the juice.

Swiss Roll, Jam or Lemon Curd

2 hen eggs, 50g (2oz) plain flour, 50g (2oz) castor sugar, pinch of salt, 15ml (1tbsp) boiling water.

Carrot Cake

17.5cm (7in) round tin, 3 medium sized carrots, grated (approx 200g 7oz), 175g (6oz) soft brown sugar, 200ml (7 fl oz) oil, 2 hen eggs beaten, 225g (8oz) SR flour, 5ml (1tsp) bicarbonate of soda, 5ml (1tsp) cinnamon, 50g (2oz) chopped walnuts. Beat oil and sugar together, add the eggs. Sift the flour, cinnamon and

bicarbonate of soda and slowly add to the mixture. Add the carrots and walnuts. Bake for 50-60 minutes in a slow oven. For the topping: 75g (3oz) cream cheese, 40g (1½ oz) unsalted butter, 45ml (3tbsp) castor sugar. Cream the butter until smooth. Add the cheese and stir in the sugar until smooth. Spread when cake is cold.

Bakewell Tart

170g (6oz) shortcrust pastry, raspberry jam, 100g (4oz) butter, 125g (4 1/2oz) caster sugar, 125g (4 1/2oz) ground almonds, 1 beaten egg, ½ tsp almond extract, 50g (2oz) flaked almonds. Line 20cm (8") round tin with pastry, bake blind. Spread base with jam. Melt butter, take off heat, stir in sugar, add ground almonds, egg & almond extract. Pour into tin, sprinkle with flaked almonds. Bake gas mark 4 (180C) for approx. 35 mins.

Courgette Cake

200g grated courgette, 150g caster sugar, 1 egg, 125ml vegetable oil, 200g plain flour, 1/2 tsp salt, 1/2 tsp bicarbonate of soda, 1/4 tsp baking powder, 1 tsp ground cinnamon, grated zest of 1 medium orange plus juice for icing, icing sugar. Beat together courgette, sugar, egg & oil. In separate bowl, sift together flour, salt, bicarbonate of soda, baking powder & cinnamon, add orange zest. Stir flour into courgette mixture, pour into greased 1kg (2lb) loaf tin. Bake 45 mins gas mark 3 (170C) till skewer comes out clean. Cool & turn out. Use icing sugar & orange juice to make an icing, drizzle over cake.

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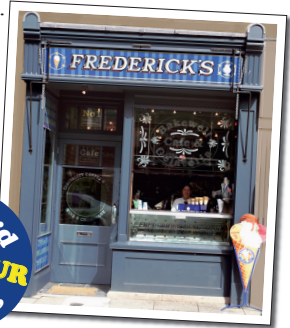


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
